On Our Cover This Month

On our cover this month is the work by sculptor Bob Doster. Unlike Waldo, it shouldn't take any effort to be able to spot a sculpture by Bob Doster of Lancaster, SC, anywhere and everywhere in the Carolinas. My suggestion is to start at your local school. My first sighting was at Bonner Elementary in Berkeley County when we first took our son to school - many, many years ago. There outside the school's office were two stainless steel benches - just like the ones scattered throughout downtown Lancaster. They were early-on creations, unlike today's unique sculptures made from school children's "hand" cutouts of stainless steel like eagles, panthers, horses, unicorns, and chameleons. If Bonner Elementary commissioned a sculpture by Doster today, they might get a large jumping fox out front of the school. Like the sculpture shown here at Howe Hall Elementary in Goose Creek, SC, in Berkeley County.

The children take part by tracing their hands on to sheets of stainless steel, and then they cut them out with a plasma cutter, with the guidance of Doster. The children even sometimes help with coming up with designs. It has got to be an amazing experience for the children, and when the final sculpture is delivered and installed, the children can search for their hands in the sculpture. You can read more about Bob Doster and his sculptures and his impact on both North and South Carolina and beyond on Page 17.

I wish we would have had a Bob Doster come to my elementary school back in Michigan. Back then we were lucky to have an art teacher visit, maybe once a month or so, and show us how to make things out of popsicle sticks or straws - like some of the projects they used to make on the *Captain*





North Charleston-based artist Madeline Dukes takes viewers on a visual tour of indoor and outdoor beauty found throughout the southeastern region of the United States in her exhibit *Flora*, *Fauna*, *Sunshine*, *Water*. Atmospheric nuances in the various terrain, light, and temperature are emphasized to showcase the beauty of the incredible yet subtle differences in our environments. While many of the paintings are based on daily plant life, some are inspired by the vistas and colors of the southern landscape. "This series is an homage to the unhomogenized regions within our environment and an emphatic ode to those differences," Dukes explains.

Dukes studied studio art and political science at Winthrop University. ern Wildlife Exposition, the Spartanburg Museum of Art, Lincoln County Museum, Sumter Museum of Art, McElvey Center, Mooresville Art Center, Pickens County Museum, the Rauch Gallery at Gaston College, and a traveling show with the South Carolina State Museum.

Dukes' work has also been featured in Fine Art Connoisseur and can be found in private and corporate collections throughout the US including the ACE Hotel in New Orleans, LA.

In her exhibit, *Pangaea: Unity and Wholeness*, Charleston-based abstract expressionist Connie Rigdon presents a collection of mixed media works in oil, acrylic, and cold wax to express her attempt to find calm and order within our fragmented artificial world. Rigdon hopes that the viewer can connect with the natural rhythms of the complexity beneath and the calmness that keeps our world and our psyches in balance. "It is my goal to invoke a feeling for the viewer," Rigdon states. "When it does, I have succeeded."

Rigdon was born in Taipei, Taiwan, raised in Hawaii, Southern California, and Taipei, and now lives and works in continued above on next column to the right Charleston. Originally an architect, she has translated her love of the Art of architecture and years of problem-solving skills into her contemporary works, bringing about a perfect union of her two passions. Her evolution from architecture to pure abstraction was inevitable in that the Art of architecture was always her true inspiration.

Rigdon's work today is that perfect blend of the influence of the man-made and natural environment's effect on how she expresses her feelings on canvas. Rigdon is currently represented by Hagan Fine Art (Charleston, SC), Presson Art Gallery (Monroe, NC), The Campbell Collective (online gallery based in Greenville, SC), and Saatchi Art (online).

Robert Lange Studios in Charleston, SC, will present *Untethered*, an evocative exploration of displacement, discovery, and the art of letting go, featuring works by Michelle Jader, on view from June 6 -27, 2025. A reception will be held on June 6, from 5-8, during the Charleston Gallery Association's ArtWalk.

The show marks a bold and personal evolution in Jader's work, reflecting on themes of upheaval, freedom, and finding home in the midst of transformation.

Created during a two-year journey across 33 states at the height of the pandemic, *Untethered* is rooted in Jader's experience of displacement and rediscovery. Best known for her layered, motion-filled paintings that blend vulnerability and strength, Jader uses this new series to explore the emotional landscape of change - from the wildfires that turned San Francisco's skies orange to the dreamlike moments of self-liberation on the open road.

"This show is about more than movement - it's about surrender and resilience," says Jader. "Untethered is a visual diary of choosing to leave everything familiar behind in search of something unknown, but essential."

A defining feature of this new body of work is Jader's integration of bold com-

positions and backgrounds. She pushes the boundaries of traditional painting by creating depth on multiple layers of acrylic panels.

Gallery owner Robert Lange praises Jader's evolution, "Michelle's work has always moved—physically, emotionally, spiritually. But Untethered feels like it's vibrating on a whole new level. Her ability to capture motion and emotion with such elegance is absolutely riveting."

"There's a raw beauty in this show that hits you the moment you walk in," Lange adds. "It's powerful, it's personal, and yet it resonates so universally. This is Michelle at her most daring."

Ella Walton Richardson Fine Art in Charleston, SC, will present Chasing Light, is a new solo exhibition of works by Kentucky artist, Donald Weber, on view from June 6 through July 7, 2025 A reception will be held on June 6, from 5-8pm, during the Charleston Gallery Association's First Friday Art Walk.

Donald Weber has created fifteen unique pieces of Charleston's architecture and its coastal imagery for his show. Each one casting its own illumination of color and perspective.

When asked if there were any ideas he wanted to convey through this collection, Weber said "I think that the title of the show Chasing Light answers that question. It's not so much what you paint that's important but how you paint it. Certainly, in each of the pieces you can see the presence of strong lights, dramatic lights, and darks. how it turned out." There is a strong presence of the bold stillness of the Lowcountry waterways along with soft nudges at the ever-present history of Charleston found strolling down its streets.

This new collection of work will include

from The University of Kentucky. He developed it further as he created illustrations for a design/build company he started with his brother in 1983 focusing on serving the entertainment industry. In his time with their company, he prepared several illustrated designs for Paramount, Nickelodeon, Warner Brothers, NASA, SeaWorld, Crayola and KSL Resorts. His connection and dedication to excellent work is undeniable as he has continued to develop his own work and memorable experiences for the viewers.

During a recent interview Donald Weber said that "there are several points of innovation and inspiration throughout the collection, I have introduced ivory black to my palette as well as have started using walnut oil as a medium." He talks about the environments he wants to capture and share with the viewer. "I have two favorite places to paint. One is New Mexico and the other is Charleston and the Lowcountry. Both areas have dramatic color and light, romantic architecture, and culture. It's hard not to be inspired by that."

For those unable to be there, Weber would like to share this with those interested in his work and process, "One thing I would like people to know is that I love to paint. That said, like anyone else or any other line of work, I have good days and I have bad days. I think for me to start what may turn out to be a great painting, I must first be inspired by a feeling or idea of a subject that my soul wants to capture on canvas. What is the essence of what each painting is about? Is it a color strategy, a composition of interesting forms, or strong lights and dark contrast? I like to get a painting to where I call

it almost finished. From that point, I give it a few days to let me view things that I may not have originally seen when in the throes of painting. Sometimes the paintings yell at me about what to change and sometimes they whisper."

The dynamic use of color and luminance pieced together with playful yet refined brushstrokes throughout this show welcome the warmth of summer and will keep you coming back for more as you chase the light in Weber's works.

sumi ink, paper, and scissors, this body of work explores how we relate - to ourselves, to others, and to everything that exists in the in-between," said Bornstein. "I began working on construction kraft paper rolls, which allowed me to move freely, painting long, meditative stretches. I believe in the energy within the work more than the idea of permanence. Everything flows and transforms, and that movement is part of the work. Art is alive - changing, breathing, and evolving with us."

Bornstein was raised in Buenos Aires, Argentina, where her passion for environmental landscapes was initiated from her upbringing near the Delta River. After graduating high school, Bornstein briefly lived in Berlin, Germany. During her time in Berlin, she became entranced by the city's versatile art scene and aura of creativity. Once she returned to Argentina, she went on to earn a BFA in art and creative writing from the Universidad De Palermo. Bornstein developed a style focused on creativity and imagination, which is evident in every piece of her artwork.

In 2017, Bornstein moved to the United States and settled in Charleston, SC. In 2020, she joined The George Gallery as a gallery assistant. In 2021, Bornstein decided



to work as a full-time artist, and this is her second solo exhibition at The George Gal-

Money cut to non-profits has to come from somewhere else - maybe rich art patrons who will make donations instead of buying more artworks. What good are the artworks they buy if there are no art museums to house them in or to give your collection to? What about corporations - won't they be making more profits so they can buy more art or support the art? But they won't want to look Woke or be acting DIY. It's all connected. There is no escape from this madness unless you just surrender and become one of them, but even then, unless you're a billionaire - one day you'll be wishing you stood up and said

So what should you be doing? Start by talking with your community about how you're not happy with what's going on, you have influence with some people. Use your artistic skills to make clever protest signs or posts on social media. Join protest rallies and carry those signs. Contact your local representative for once and let them know you want them to act for the people, not special interest. And, then you could show up and vote in elections, stand in line with other citizens. Hopefully it's not your first time. Now, for the hardest part, make a donation to an effort that represents your interest - either to a group or an individual.

The point is - make a difference!



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


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Upcountry History Museum in Greenville, SC, Offers Two New Exhibitions

The Upcountry History Museum in Greenville, SC, is offering two new exhibitions including: *Dinosaurs: Land of Fire and Ice*. on view through Sept. 21, 2025, and *Avengers: Endgame – The Exhibition*, on view from June 7 through Jan. 18, 2026.

Crossing the threshold of this special exhibition means traveling back in time to explore the Age of the Dinosaurs. As visitors move through the exhibit they encounter unfamiliar landscapes, touchable dinosaurs of all shapes and sizes, and opportunities to investigate clues about what the dinosaurs left behind. The exhibit builds on the popular fascination with dinosaurs and includes science, history, and literacy based activities to challenge all ages.

Dinosaurs: Land of Fire and Ice, designed for children ages 3-10, is the first child-centered exhibit dedicated to expanding the understanding of dinosaur habitat and range. The bilingual (Spanish and English) exhibit features three distinct sections that build on a child's innate curiosity about dinosaurs: Land of Fire (a warm dinosaur habitat), Land of Ice (a cold dinosaur habitat), and a Field Research Station (complete with a Big Dig experience).

The steamy *Land of Fire* - present day Montana - introduces visitors to the Triceratops, T-Rex, and the dinosaurs who called this environment home. Children can circle the land in insect costumes, buzz through a volcano with oozing lava, work through a swampy bog, and identify an ecosystem of animals and plants.

No coats are needed for a trip across the *Land of Ice* where visitors meet the dinosaurs who made their homes in the cold climate of present day Alaska. Activities include exploring an icy cave filled with northern lights effects, breezing down an icy slide, and creating a Cretaceous food chain in an environment based on cold dinosaur habitats 70 million years ago.

In the hands-on Field Research Station children and their caregivers don goggles and research vests, as they uncover dinosaur bones in a dig station and examine fossils to identify dinosaurs.

This immersive exhibit includes sculpted, touchable dinosaurs that feature the most recent scientific findings about the colors, textures and structural form of the dinosaurs. Designed to spark children's interest in science and history, the exhibit will immerse visitors in meaningful science experiences and activities that use scientific thinking skills; focus on history, natural history, and paleontology; and provide opportunities to build literacy and vocabulary skills through interactive activities.

The other exhibition being offered is *Avengers: Endgame – The Exhibition*, on view from June 7, 2025 through Jan. 18, 2026

Stan Lee, writer, editor, comic book creator said, "In the comic books and the movies, the story is always the most important element."

For over 85 years, creating independent yet deeply connected stories has been the foundation of the Marvel Universe. Conceived from a simple idea of strange tales and journeys in 1939 with the publication of Marvel Comics #1, Marvel

began to create a world with visual and cultural impact that has continued to influence readers and viewers today.

As the comic book industry gained momentum in the 1930s, Stan Lee, an aspiring writer, joined Timely Comics, the forerunner to Marvel Comics. In 1940, Timely introduced characters such as Captain America, Toro, the Whizzer, and even Miss America, who with the Human Torch, founded the Invaders, dedicated to combating Nazi forces in Europe. Following the war, the group was renamed the All-Winners Squad with the mission to fight crime in the US.

Over the next two decades, new characters in different genres expanded the growing repertoire of stories which furthered the narratives of heroes and villains. By the 1960s, Marvel had risen in popularity. Lee and artist Jack Kirby created the company's first family with The Fantastic Four in 1961, followed in 1962 with Spider-Man, Daredevil, Nick Fury, Incredible Hulk, and the X-Men.

In 1963 Marvel created a team of superheroes including Captain America, Iron Man, Black Widow, Thor, Hawkeye, Hulk, and Black Panther. Named The Avengers, their mission was to stand as Earth's first line of defense against the most powerful threats in the universe.

By 2012, movies and television shows were the outlets for Marvel Universe characters, the parent company became Marvel Cinematic Universe. The Avengers continued to provide audiences with thrilling storylines based on their mission as seen in 2012, 2015, and 2018 films.

Avengers: Endgame debuted in theaters in 2019 and became the highest-grossing film of all time that year. In partnership with The Walt Disney Company's Marvel Studios and private collectors, the Upcountry History Museum will present an exclusive 2000 square foot exhibition featuring an extraordinary display of original costumes, props, and memorabilia showcasing the film's messages of teamwork, courage, and perseverance.

The first exhibition of its kind in the United States, the project invites visitors of all ages to traverse the Marvel Universe. This once-in-a-lifetime experience will explore the fourth installment in the Avengers saga and is the culmination of 22 interconnected Marvel films and the climax of a journey. The exhibit's design and messaging will emulate *Avengers: Endgame's* principles of friendship, teamwork, and setting aside differences to overcome impossible obstacles.



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University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, Offers Works by Aaron Tucker, Mark Flowers & Jeremy Phillips

The University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting Faces, Places & Layered Dreams, featuring works by Aaron Tucker, Mark Flowers and Jeremy Phillips, on view in the USC Upstate Art Gallery, located at the Chapman Cultural Center, through Aug. 16, 2025. May 15 – August 16, 2025

Flowers, Phillips and Tucker are all based out of Asheville, NC, and create abstract paintings and/or collages that stem from representational imagery. Various degrees of abstraction seen throughout the works in this exhibit range from obscure to more defined depictions. Each of these seasoned artists has developed and honed his own style, uniquely showcasing his artistic skill and reflecting his own personal identity. Each uses photographs as reference, layering paint and imagery to express an underlying personal narrative.

Each member of this trio actively participates at Pink Dog Creative in Asheville's River Arts District, which offers the opportunity for close proximity to one another. This enables regular, active conversations about surface, mark-making, critique and shared observations regarding each other's artwork. Ongoing dialogue between them offers a creative community that is similar or akin to that, which often exists in a graduate school setting. As friends and admirers of each other's work, the three share camaraderie and mutual respect, which influences their individual artistry. While

personal processing of life experiences is reflected in the individual artist's work, the pieces in this show feature differing themes as subject matter.

Tucker's focus could be viewed as traditional portraiture, except the women portrayed in the paintings are unknown so that their personage is not the intention, rather the painting itself acts as the driver.

Phillips' paintings are centered on places that he has lived from a bird's eye or aerial view, in which landscapes become compositions that allow his exploration of the possibilities of oil paint.

In Flowers' work, he also relies on place by capturing cell phone images through the windows of commuter trains, which are then printed, layered with paint and mixed media, becoming emotive narratives. In all three cases, these artists present compelling compositions that offer an expressive glimpse into each of their own stories.

Sculptor Bob Doster's Metal Creations Exhibited Throughout the Carolinas

Anytime is a good time for a road trip, particularly when your destination features both natural beauty and remarkable artwork. During your journey, you may encounter works by Lancaster, SC, artist Bob Doster, which are prominently displayed throughout the Southeast and beyond. Doster has been creating for nearly seventy years and is known for his sculptures and student works created under his guidance. Here is a list of notables to visit when traveling across the Carolinas.

The Anderson Arts Center's "SCULP-TOUR" features his sculpture *Hyperbolic II* in a year-long public exhibit. Doster's permanent works, including art benches and student-created pieces, can be found throughout Anderson, known as the "Electric City."

While in the area, consider making a stop in Travelers Rest to visit Eagle Mountain Vineyards and Winery. Art is a big part of the Eagle Mountain experience, where original paintings decorate the walls of the tasting room and sculptures, including three by Bob Doster edge a walking trail alongside a tranquil stream. It's all part of the winery's sylvan sculpture garden, which displays works from artists near and far.

At USC Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, find several of Doster's works among many artists. The Curtis R. Harley Art Gallery showcases 21 outdoor sculptures across campus. These pieces are available year-round and can be seen at the Sansbury Campus Life Center, Performing Arts Center, Horace Smith building, Tukey Theatre, and Library.

While in Spartanburg, look for *I Love You*, a sculpture created with students of South Carolina School for the Deaf and Blind. Other works by Doster and by students during artist residencies led by

sanctuary, offering freedom, healing, and resilience. It challenges stereotypes and illuminates the therapeutic power of riding, where the hum of an engine becomes a form of meditation.

Black bikers have historically contributed to American motorcycle culture, yet their story and legacy remain untold. This exhibition urges viewers to reconsider their preconceptions about the bike culture and its riders. It invites an understanding that transcends stereotypes and acknowledges the strength of community, the importance of mental health support, and the value of genuine second chances.

Alvin C. Jacobs, Jr., a native of Rockford, IL, is a photographer and image activist based in Charlotte, recognized for his striking black-and-white documentary work. Immersed in motorcycle culture from an early age, Jacobs grew up near the world's oldest family-owned Harley-Davidson dealership and was influenced by his father's motorcycle clubhouse, established in 1977. These experiences fostered a profound connection to the biker community, which he now captures through photography.

Jacobs honed his craft on the front lines of America's social justice movements, capturing pivotal moments in cities such as Ferguson, MO; Minneapolis, MN; New York City; and Charlottesville, VA. His

distinctive aesthetic is marked by a propensity to highlight stark contrast and work in black and white – both in photography and the world. He also contributed to the award-winning exhibit, K(NO)W Justice, K(NO)W Peace, at Levine Museum of the New South.

Gantt Center's artist-in-residence, during which he produced the award-winning exhibition Welcome to Brookhill, a compelling visual narrative of Charlotte's historic Brookhill Village. The Harvey B. Gantt Center for African-American Arts & Culture in Charlotte, NC, at the Levine Center for the Arts is presenting Chop Shop: We Are Here, curated by Steven M. Cozart and Roymieco Carter, on view through Oct. 26, 2025.

Chop Shop: We Are Here is a collective exploration of racial consciousness and identity through drawing, painting, and sculpture. The Chop Shop Artists Collective, a group of Black and Brown male artists, was founded in 2020 during the global pandemic as a space for virtual conversations and fellowship. In the wake of George Floyd's murder and its worldwide broadcast, these artists found strength in community, bonding over shared experiences.

Many members are educators who recognize art's power to teach and inspire. The phrase "We Are Here" – an assertion of presence-counters the strategies of separation and control that have historically been used to oppress Black and Brown people, especially within educational institutions, employment opportunities, and fine art

We are thrilled to present our third biennial of established and emerging Black artists in our region. Our inaugural biennial, Visual Vanguard, launched in the summer of 2021 during the pandemic and the Black Lives Matter movement – a pivotal time in our nation's history. The second biennial in 2023, my Presence is Present, explored Afro-surrealism and carried the mantle of Black excellence and evolution in art and

Chop Shop: We Are Here highlights the transformative role of the arts in confronting the challenges faced by Black and Brown men – issues frequently neglected by mainstream society.

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University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, Features Works by the Late Peter Lenzo

The University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, will present In Memory of his Memory, featuring sculptures by the late Peter Lenzo (1955-2024), on view in the McMaster Gallery, from June 6 -27, 2025. A reception will be held on June 6, from

The exhibition celebrates the life and art of Peter Lenzo featuring artwork created in Chicago during his final years and never previously shown in South Carolina.

Lenzo is a widely recognized ceramic sculptor with a national profile. The New York City native, who grew up in Detroit, was selected for the 1995 and 1998 South Carolina Triennial exhibitions at the South Carolina State Museum in Columbia. Lenzo is known for sculptures based on traditional southern face jugs. He distorts the facial expressions and sometimes attaches bizarre, fantastical, kitsch, and grotesque objects onto a traditional face jug form. Some of his face jugs are more realistic portraits while others are pure fantasy.

Lenzo took his first clay class when he was ten years old at The School of Arts and Crafts in Detroit, MI. It was not until age 14, however, that he decided to pursue clay seriously after seeing his brother turning a vessel on a potter's wheel. At the age of 15, he was given a potter's wheel and one year later dropped out of conventional high school.

earn his diploma and throughout continued to take pottery classes. At age 22 Lenzo was involved in a biking accident that resulted in chronic seizures. His work has been interpreted as a visual expression of the painful experience of having a seizure. Some of the face jugs are covered with found objects including shards stuck into the faces as if

the head were exploding. From 1991-2001, Lenzo's work transitioned from resembling stylized traditional Southern face jugs to more realistic self-portraits.

The following is Lenzo's artist statement, "The impetus for my ceramic sculptures came from traditional Southern face jugs. I had switched to working in clay exclusively in the 1990s. I had been making sculptural assemblages but had to stop because I couldn't use a table saw any longer as I increasingly suffered from seizures, which are the result of brain damage sustained in a bicycle accident in my youth. Table saws and seizures don't mix."

"I always had been intrigued by face jugs, especially those made by Southern slaves," adds Lenzo. "At my middle school, we tried to develop projects that appealed to our African-American students, and so I decided to have them make face jugs. I had never made any, so I first created several jugs myself. Each batch got better, but more importantly, when I finished a batch. I couldn't wait to make the next one. It just seemed to be in my bones. It felt like I had made them before - that I was catching up where I had left off. I wanted to let everything go in my current life and go back to a previous one that I had discovered. I once was lost and now was found."

"From the jugs I came to the current, more elaborate sculptures. It started when my then 4-year-old son Joe started to stick pottery shards, which I used for teeth, in one of my jugs. He went wild and put them all over the nose, eyes and lips. I began to help him and gradually really liked the results. My style was very different, and I had much more respect for the face, but to this day, Joe claims he made me famous."

Columbia Museum of Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting the exhibition, *Let's Have* a Talk: Black Artists from the CMA Collection, on view through Aug. 31, 2025

Bringing together a multigenerational group of 15 Black artists working in and around abstraction, Let's Have a Talk pushes against longstanding expectations that work by Black artists must present a clear message about their racial identity and experience, and it celebrates their crucial, yet often dismissed, role in abstract art.







colors, and textures for the perfect element. As I work, new characters and their personalities emerge," adds Merett.



The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is presenting *Native America: In Translation*, featuring powerful contemporary photography by Indigenous artists, challenging history and reimagines identity, on view in the Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall, through Nov. 3, 2025.

Blowing Rock Art & History Museum (BRAHM) in Blowing Rock, NC, will present several new exhibits including: *Mary Lou Higgins: Sibylline Faces*, on view in the Schaefer Gallery, from June 1 through Nov., 30, 2025, and *Daingerfield and the Tonalist Instinct*, on view in the Fort Gallery, through Oct. 19, 2025.

Sibylline Faces presents a selection of ceramic works and drawings by MaryLou Higgins (1926–2012), an artist active in North Carolina throughout her prolific career. Best known for her illustrative approach to ceramics, Higgins worked across multiple media, creating a body of work defined by intricate draftsmanship and a focus on the female figure.

A voracious illustrator, Higgins filled the surfaces of her vessels and forms with an evolving repertory of female faces and figures, rendered with baroque embellishment and a distinct physicality. Often gilded and highly ornamented, these works foreground the female visage, as do the elongated or voluptuous silhouettes of the forms themselves. Her drawing practice extended beyond ceramics into works on paper, canvas, and handmade furniture, where her dense, gestural approach to line and composition further reveals her inter-

est in stylized figuration.

Higgins often collaborated with her husband, Edward Higgins, who at times constructed the ceramic forms she adorned. The figures that populate her work have been compared to the Sibyls - prophetesses of ancient Greece who were believed to articulate divine revelations in rhythmic verse while in a trance. The exaggerated features and expressive gestures of her figures also recall the stylized bodies of late 16th-century Italian, or Mancontinued on Page 23

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nerist, painting, suggesting an engagement with historical representations of the feminine form.

The North Carolina Arts Council has been working with artists and arts organizations to find ways to recover and build their creative enterprises back stronger after the devastation caused by Hurricane Helene in the fall of 2024. Our series Portraits in Resilience has been highlighting artists from the region to discover how they are re-

sponding. This month, we showcase Sarah Jones Decker of Marshall, a writer and photographer who has been documenting her community in the aftermath of the storm.

As a child, Sarah felt drawn to write. continued above on next column to the right


When she learned about photography, she realized the symbiotic relationship of the two media, and pursued them both. With a bachelor's degree in journalism from Virginia Tech and a master's in photography from the Savannah College of Art and Design, Sarah had the skills to pursue her dream of telling stories in words and pictures. Sarah says, "I have always considered myself on the documentary side, constantly capturing the world around me no matter what I might be up to at that time."

Like a lot of people who live in western North Carolina, Sarah is drawn to nature and being active outside. She has invested her love of nature in publications about the trails of the area. "I wrote the history and took photos of every shelter on the Appalachian Trail, and I wrote our local hiking guide, The Ridges of Madison County," Sarah says. "My current work in progress is The 100 Classic Hikes of North Carolina, for Mountaineers Books." Sarah is trail maintainer and sawver with the Carolina Mountain Club and maintains a section of the Appalachian Trail north of Hot Springs She and her husband have owned Root Bottom Farm in Marshall since 2011.

In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, Sarah knew that her calling as a documentarian meant that she needed to capture the devastation of the landscape and the resilience of the residents as they cooperated to save their neighbors. Through the specialized technique of tintype1 photography, she set to work taking photos of the historic changes taking place.

"I took a summer tintype class solely our next Mermaid Parade in Marshall that way," Sarah says. "After 30 years in the medium, a new challenge was exciting. Wet plate photography is a notoriously delicate and finicky medium. I never thought that less than five months later, I would build a makeshift darkroom in the back of mv Subaru and shoot my beloved town after it was devastated by Helene. I had only practiced in my home darkroom twice before the storm."

As she volunteered and helped her neighbors, she was reminded of a truth she already knew: community is much more than buildings; it's the people you encounter in your daily life. "This project has connected me to so many new friends and given me the chance to spend more time with people I love," she says. "After weeks of volunteering, it was an awesome experience to create art together. It's a lot to ask someone who has lost so much to give you an hour of their time. I will cherish every single image and the magic we made together. It's been my honor." Each of Sarah's images is unique,

and has a warm nostalgic and atmospheric feel, bringing a humanity to the subject that is hard to describe.

As she considers the future, Sarah is hopeful for the region's recovery. She is looking forward to a solo show of her Marshall tintypes at the Weizenblatt Gallery, on the Mars Hill University campus, in September. She is in her second year working on her next book cataloguing the 100 best hikes in North Carolina. "Getting paid to hike, write, and photograph is really a trifecta of things I love," she tells us. "It has been a great experience to see so much of what this beautiful state has to offer, from the mountains to the coast."

Reflecting on the experience of the past year, she says, "I've always made art, and I don't see that changing. I had a lot of uncertainty for this project, but I went for It anyway. I think this experience reminds me to just keep doing the darn things - make the work and challenge yourself to get uncomfortable again."

1 Tintypes are an early form of photography introduced in Paris in 1853 by Adolphe Alexandre Martin. Through a chemical process that creates a direct positive on a thin

sheet of metal, a tintype creates an image that is a camera original. Unless otherwise fitted with a specific type of mirror, tintypes create a mirror image, reversed left to right from reality.

Appalachian State University in Boone, NC, Offers New Exhibitions

Appalachian State University in Boone, NC, will present several new exhibitions on view at the Turchin Center for the Visual Art including: *Image and Music: John Cohen*, on view in the Bickers Gallery, from June 6 through Dec. 13, 2025 and *I Remember: Elizabeth Stone*, on view in the Mayer Gallery, fro June 6 through Nov. 1, 2025.

The following is a curatorial statement, "Photographer, filmmaker, musician, and folklorist, John Cohen visited Appalachian State University to play his guitar with The Dust Busters during the Black Banjo Gathering in March 2010. Eli Smith of the Down Home Radio Show captured the performance in photographs. Professor of Interdisciplinary Studies and Co-Director of the University Documentary Film Services, Tom Hansell, has video recordings of the performance and interviews with Cohen from his visit to campus."

"The Turchin Center for the Visual Arts is pleased to partner with John Cohen's extended family and L. Parker Stephenson who represents Cohen's musical estate, to bring an exhibition of Cohen's Appalachian photographs to the Appalachian State University campus. The installation will be accompanied by extended programming showcasing films made by and about John Cohen as well as performances of traditional Appalachian music. Many of John Cohen's books will be available for browsing in the Turchin Center's Moskowitz Gallery during open hours."

The following artist's biography is courtesy of L. Parker Stephenson Photographs and the John Cohen family:

Born in Queens, New York, John Cohen (1932-2019) was a true polymath. Among his many talents were photography, filmmaking, writing, music, folklore, and ethnomusicology.

Cohen studied painting at Yale University under Josef Albers and photography with Herbert Matter, receiving an MFA in the 1950s. Cohen also researched indigenous Andean weaving in Peru. His photographs of Peru would be the first photographic exhibition held at the Yale University Art Gallery, shown alongside textiles by Anni Albers. Parallel with his research in Peru, Cohen's interests in old-time music led him to make numerous field recordings in Appalachia. These recordings are an important document of rural culture, contemporaneous with those collected by Alan Lomax and Harry Smith, now held by the Library of Congress.

Cohen was a founding member of the famed New Lost City Ramblers in 1958, which began a long career as a performer. His photographs of Roscoe Holcomb, Woody Guthrie, Muddy Waters, Elizabeth Cotten, a young Bob Dylan, and many other notable musicians, provide a visual window

into this rich aural world. His 1962 film, High Lonesome Sound, became synonymous with that music. Cohen performed regularly with the Downhill Strugglers and was often called upon as a resource for ethnomusicologist scholars and researchers alike

Herbert and Mercedes Matter would provide introductions for Cohen to the nascent artistic communities in downtown Manhattan when he moved to East Ninth Street and Third Avenue in 1957. The location would be fortuitous: dirt-cheap rents adjacent to the bars and artists' clubs in Greenwich Village, and the scene of numerous artist-run galleries and performance spaces. Cohen lived next door to Mary and Robert Frank, who would ask Cohen to photograph Frank's first film, Pull My Daisy (1959), co-directed with painter Alfred Leslie and narrated by Jack Kerouac. Cohen emphasized the ambience and mood among the cast and crew, which included Larry Rivers, Delphine Seyrig, Allen Ginsberg, Gregory Corso, David Amran, Richard Bellamy, and Alice Neel.

John Cohen began making photographs in 1954 when the only work for a photographer was in photojournalism or advertising, neither of which he wanted to do. Rather, he made personal photographs, documenting things which were important to him: mostly artists and musicians. His photographic inquiries lead him to the Andes and to Appalachia, where he photographed traditional musicians in their homes. In addition to gaining fine art notoriety, his images were used on record covers, in television and movie productions, and later informed his film projects. With his long-time publisher, Steidl, Cohen published several photography books.

Cohen was featured in over forty solo exhibitions across the US; his work was central to group exhibitions presented at the Pompidou Centre in Paris, the Grey Art Gallery at New York University, the Museum of the City of New York, the Corcoran Gallery of Art, among others. His photographs are in the permanent collections of twenty institutions and his ninth monograph, Speed Bumps on a Dirt Road, was released in September 2019. Invested

in the future of the field, Cohen started the photography program at SUNY Purchase in 1972 where he taught for 25 years. His photographic estate is represented by L. Parker Stephenson in New York.

The curatorial statement for the exhibit, I Remember: Elizabeth Stone follows, "Photographer Elizabeth Sone thinks deeply about community connections. Sharing in the participatory multi-generational stories of I Remember is an opportunity for Turchin Center visitors to connect with extended communities across North Carolina. The negatives and faded 35mm slides that Stone gathers through donations and then weaves into ethereal sculptural forms create a shared vison which is both specific and anonymous. Her installations include identifiable individuals; at the same time, we see ourselves as part of a collective whole. Memories recede and reemerge. They are bright and fade with time. The precious instances we capture on film are often the only traces of people and places no longer with us. Reminiscing keeps memories vividly alive. Stone will work with photography students from the Department of Art at Appalachian State University to create additional pieces for the installation, bringing Boone into her extended North Carolina reverie."

"Elizabeth Stone is a Montana-based visual artist exploring potent themes of memory and time deeply rooted within the ambiguity of photography. Stone's work has been exhibited and is held in collections including the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, Texas; Center for Creative Photography, Tucson, Arizona; Cassilhaus, Chapel Hill, North Carolina; Yellowstone Art Museum, Billings, Montana; Candela Collection, Richmond, Virginia: Archive 192, New York, New York; and the Nevada Museum of Art Special Collections Library, Reno, Nevada. Fellowships include Cassilhaus, Ucross Foundation, Jentel Arts, Willapa Bay AIR, the National Park Service, and the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts through the Montana Fellowship award from the LEAW Foundation (2019). Process drives Stone's work as she continues to push and pull at the edge of what defines

and how we see the photograph.

Stone offered the following artist statement, "Babies, funerals, graduations, school holiday programs, birthday cakes, cats lying on owners, wilderness adventures, vacations, weddings, friends, laughing, family gatherings, first day of school...the images in these artworks, captured on small frames of photographic film, reveal moments in our lives, slices of time that stir memories and encourage reflection."

"The I Remember Project is a participatory multi-generational community engagement project inspired by Joe Brainard's book, I Remember. It was conceived during the imposed isolation of the pandemic in 2020 and created during an artist-in-residency at Cassilhaus in Chapel Hill, NC, in October 2021."

"These artworks incorporate thousands of photographic negatives and slides that were collected from generous community members in Central North Carolina communities," adds Stone.

"Negatives were found gathering dust in old wooden crates in a garage, in old notebooks filled with personal history, in boxes under beds, tucked away in basement storage, and piled up in envelopes in a desk drawer. Negatives and prints were also donated by present day students working in the wet darkroom, embracing the tactile process of traditional photography as an alternative means of expression."

"While binding these materials together into the final artworks, I thought a lot about what defines a community and how we gather in meaningful ways. The sharing

of stories is often at the core of human connection and photographs can remind us that our shared memories greatly outweigh our differences. Sparked by the power of family photographs, this project has become an opportunity for these communities to participate, pause and reconsider the many

Seagrove Wood Fire NC, a Two-Day Studio Driving Tour, in Seagrove, NC, **Takes Place - June 7 & 8, 2025**

The Seagrove Wood Fire NC, a two-day driving tour of Seagrove, NC, celebrates the role of wood firing in the creation of ceramics, will be held at the Seagrove Potteries the first weekend in June. June 7-8, from 10am - 5pm. The event is free. We welcome wood fired pottery enthusiasts to enjoy a self-guided tour featuring fifteen wood fire potters in our community.

Learn about the process of firing with wood and discover the extensive array of effects each potter renders from the atmosphere inside a wood firing.

Some of the kilns take nearly a week to fire, stoking them with wood every 10 minutes or so. Volatile compounds including molten ash float and flash onto surfaces, building up and creating effects which can dramatically or subtly enhance a pot.

The potters representing this group are a mix of traditional and contemporary, so the finished pots differ. "Some of us can trace our family history back hundreds of years to farmers who used the local clay to craft wares from clay here in Seagrove going back eight generations. Others have been

drawn to the potters area after studying in faraway places like Estonia and Japan and bring unique techniques to the community".







A sought-after educator and speaker, she has led workshops at Penland School of Craft (NC), Haystack Mountain School of Crafts (ME), Arrowmont School of Arts and Crafts (TN), and The Metropolitan Museum of Art (NYC), and presented at conferences including the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts and Women Working

Like a storm that both unsettles and awakens. Connell's practice embraces chaos, care, and the transformative force of motherhood – each sculpture holding the tension between breaking and being held.

Jeana Eve Klein is a multidisciplinary artist and educator based in Boone, NC, where she is Professor of Fibers at Appalachian State University. Working at the intersection of textiles, digital media, and social practice, her studio practice explores themes of labor, memory, value, and the often-tenuous relationship between lived experience and its digital representation. From bead-woven recreations of family photographs to AI-generated weaving experiments, her recent projects examine the disconnect between physical reality and virtual perception.

Klein's work has been exhibited nationally, with solo shows at OZ Arts (Nashville) and ArtSpace (Raleigh), and group exhibitions at the Museum of Design (Atlanta) and PULSE Contemporary Art Fair (Miami Beach). She holds an MFA from Arizona State University and a BFA from North Carolina State University and is a recipient of the North Carolina Arts Council Individual Craft Artist Fellowship.

Jenny Pickens is a self-taught, multidisciplinary artist born and raised in Asheville, NC, whose work spans over four decades and a wide range of media - from fiber arts and pottery to pen & ink, oils, and hand crafted dolls. Deeply rooted in the Black experience, her work reflects stories of resilience, culture, and identity, often gracing public spaces, galleries, and publications such as The New York Times, Mountain *Xpress*, *The Laurel of Asheville*, and more.

Pickens has been featured on Blue Ridge Public Radio, Samantha Brown's Places to Love, and The Story of Art in America, and is known locally for her celebrated murals, including her role as a lead artist for Asheville's Black Lives Matter mural. In addition to her studio practice, she teaches art at Asheville PEAK Academy and leads workshops that empower youth and community through creativity. Whether through dolls, murals, or mixed media, Pickens continues to uplift and inspire, using her art as a bridge between generations and cultures.

Kenny Pieper is a master glass artist whose elegant vessels and sculptural works reflect the natural beauty of his home in the mountains of North Carolina. Raised in the region, he began his craft at the Penland School of Craft and went on to study at the Center for Creative Studies in Detroit and

earn his BFA from California College of the

After 16 years working as a glassblower in the San Francisco Bay Area, Pieper returned to North Carolina, where he deepened his expertise in traditional Italian glass techniques while managing the glass studios at Penland. His work, known for its refined form and technical brilliance, is held in the collections of the Corning Museum of Glass (NY), Museum of Fine Arts Boston. Asheville Art Museum, and others

Daniel Rich is a painter known for his precise, hard-edged depictions of architecture that explore the visual language of power, control, and memory. He received his MFA from Tufts University and the School of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, and has exhibited widely, with solo shows at Miles McEnery Gallery (New York), StudioTrouble (Berlin), and the Museum of Fine Arts Boston, among others.

Rich's work is held in public and private collections including the Museum of Fine Arts Boston, Collezione Maramotti (Italy), and the Hudson Valley Museum of Contemporary Art. Living and working between Blowing Rock, NC, and Berlin, Germany, Rich approaches painting with the focus of stillness in a storm - his compositions revealing the quiet, systemic forces that shape our built environment.

Jerrie Settles, known artistically as JEMS Creations Art, creates work deeply rooted in faith, family, and the enduring grace of God. Her creative journey began with the 2007 publication of her children's book A Prayer for Wings – A Journey of Nipaerilla the Caterpillar, which she both authored and illustrated. Since then, her artistic expression has expanded to include tutoring, art therapy, and digital media, all united by a spiritual thread that runs through each piece.

Settles signs her work "JEMS," a name infused with personal meaning, honoring her family and faith: J for Jerrie, E for Essie (her grandmother and childhood hero), M for Mae (a name she chose on her adoption day), and S for Settles (her married name). To her, JEMS also carries a divine message - Jesus Eternally Making Sketches - a reminder that God's creative work is ongoing in her life. As a "Trusted Art Seller" with The Art Storefronts Organization, Settles proudly stands behind the quality and heart of every piece she creates.


Margo Vaughn is an abstract painter whose layered, exploratory process blends expressive drawing with contemporary painting fundamentals including color, composition, texture, and balance. Working primarily in acrylic with elements of collage and mixed media, her pieces invite viewers into a deep, immersive space where surface and emotion intertwine. Each painting becomes a quiet excavation, encouraging close inspection and dialogue with what lies beneath. Rooted in the psychology of the shadow self, Vaughn's work gives form to unspoken emotions – grief, memory, fear, and longing offering a visual language for the complex and often hidden corners of

These tattoos of concrete, memory, and movement speak to Cuba's past, present, and future - an invitation to experience this place not as a backdrop, but as a body.

As one of Cuba's most renowned abstractionists, Rigoberto Mena (b. 1961, Artemisa, Cuba) draws inspiration from the urban landscapes of his homeland and the

resilient spirit of the Cuban people. In 2011, following the success of his solo exhibition Hablando en Lenguas, Mena was selected for inclusion in the collection of the National Museum of Fine Arts in Cuba.

Mena's work is also featured in the collections of the Museum of Latin American Art (MOLAA) in Los Angeles; the Consejo Nacional de las Artes Plásticas in Havana, Cuba; and the Centro de Arte Contemporáneo Wifredo Lam, also in Havana. Additionally, Mena's art has been exhibited widely in China, Germany, the Netherlands, Mexico, Spain, France, and across the United States, including in Miami, Boston, Washington, D.C., and California.

Planes of colors serve as comforting places to land in peace before the next wave of confusion. Thorn is a fulltime painter residing in Raleigh, NC.

She received a BFA with a concentration in Graphic Design from Western Carolina University. Thorn is the recipient of a

United Arts Council grant. She has exhibited work in group and solo exhibitions at Cameron Art Museum, GreenHill Center for North Carolina Art, The Carrack Modern Museum, and other venues throughout the Southeast. Thorn currently has a studio at Anchorlight Studios in Raleigh, NC.

Tonya Solley Thornton's work is deeply rooted in play and experimentation with her studio materials. She often works with found objects and fabrics sourced from thrift stores and flea markets. Using collage and found-object sculpture, she explores the expressive potential of shape, color, and texture, allowing the found materials to guide her compositions.

She earned her BFA from Florida State University and her MFA from Mills College in Oakland, CA. She has received several awards and fellowships, including the United Arts Wake County Artist Support Grant. The City of Raleigh, NC, Offers Several Exhibitions at the Sertoma Arts Center

The City of Raleigh, NC, is presenting several exhibits on view at the Sertoma Arts Center, located in the heart of Shelley Lake Park, Raleigh, including: Lines that Connect - A Confluence of Celtic Knots, Kolam, and Mandana, featuring works by Sampada Kodagali Agarwal, on view in the Raleigh Room, through June 25; Both/And, featuring a collection of modern quilts by Jennifer (Jenn) Marks, on view in the Hall Gallery, through June 25; and Multifarious Imaginations, featuring digital blended collages that create a bright, fun, unique, and visionary experience by Mark C. Blanchard, on view in the Wall Case, through June 25, 2025.

The main goal driving Sampada Kodagali Agarwal's creative journey is to use art as a medium to highlight similarities, celebrate differences, and keep art at the forefront. She grew up seeing her mother make floor art at the entrance of their home in India, every single day. So, this seemed a natural starting point for her.

Kodagali Agarwal takes this opportunity to showcase two of the (many) traditional floor art styles from India (Kolam and Mandana), in a global context. When she studied a Kolam motif, she saw similarities with Celtic knots; the intricacies of the Mandana style could add further pizzazz to the knot work. Such merging of styles seemed a logical progression for her. She has explored non-traditional mediums like found wood, dry leaves, and acrylic sheets, along with the use of red clay; thus, making art more contemporary, yet rooted in tradition.

Kodagali Agarwal is a passionate visual artist, based in Morrisville, NC, who has spent more than two decades exploring traditional folk and tribal arts from India, the country of her birth; while living in the United States, her adopted country. She is also a Certified Zentangle Teacher.

Kodagali Agarwal finds joy in bringing art into everyday life by using different mediums like ceramic, wood, canvas, paper, fabric and even an organic medium like dry leaves! The different mediums add another dimension to the merging of the styles and pushes the envelope. After all, isn't that the purpose of art - to provide your viewer food for thought?

A selection of modern quilts designed and sewn by Jennifer Marks. She resists the constraints of either/or in her life and in her work. Our brains, seeking pattern and order, try to categorize and sort all we see into mutually exclusive, tidy boxes. Yet we humans are complex, multifaceted, messy.

This selection of both highly structured, symmetrical, even minimalist designs; and improvisationally designed and pieced works with varying degrees of thematic boundaries such as color, shape, and size demonstrate both the need for order and the desire for freedom from its constraints.

Viewers are invited to consider the ways they themselves are more complex than

simple binary categories can capture. Have you experienced being labeled as one thing, but knowing that you are so much more?

Marks is a modern quilter living in Raleigh, NC - where she also spent her childhood, before a stint on the North Shore of Massachusetts long enough to still be able to easily slip into a convincing Boston accent. She earned her PhD in Sociology from NC State University, which is to say that her artistic education has been decidedly nontraditional and informal - two adjectives that could be used to describe Jenn overall. She is also a wife, mother of two teens, and an E-RYT 500 certified Yoga teacher. She learned to sew as many women do, from her mother, primarily garments and home goods. Once she got a taste of modern quilting, there was no turning back.

The exhibit, *Multifarious Imaginations*, exhibits digital blended collages that create a bright, fun, unique, and visionary experience by Mark C. Blanchard. The project is a conglomeration of vivid imagination. These pieces blend patterns, images, and designs until a saturation of swirling colors comes alive into a new living artistic creation.

The origin of each "imagination" starts with abandoning preconceived conceptions. Free of judgments of possibilities that allow the artistic spirits to come alive and transform into illogical absurdities that breathe new life as a harmonious creation.

Blanchard's goal as a creator is to persuade the viewer to explore the poetic romance within the pulse of rhythms and vibrations of their own imagination.

Blanchard is a NC native, born in Tarboro, and currently calls Garner his home. He started his artistic journey at an early age with drawing and painting. After a love of music came along, he ended up playing in a psychedelic-rock band in Raleigh in the late 80's. When the Rockstar vision fizzled, photography became his main exploration and continues to be his main artistic inspiration today, but now with more of an abstract examination.

These days Blanchard is still creative in photography, but mostly he is spending his artistic energy developing digital collages that create unique works of art that are bright and fun and produce a unique and visionary experience.

With any of these artistic journeys, Blanchard's playful energy is to create a mood with his art that's more airy than grounded, foolish rather than factual, but in the end, sincere enough to generate feelings and emotions within the viewer.

Blanchard has exhibited at the Durham Art Guild, Carrack Gallery, ArtSpace, and Duke University Hospital along with various art markets in the Triangle area.

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campus in Lacoste, France this summer.

Keul offered the following artist's statement, "Having had an unconventional adolescence, flying back and forth between parents...and coasts, and being sent, at age 16, to a therapeutic boarding school in Western Samoa, art has been true north on my life's compass, helping to guide me through some turbulent events and teaching me the value of patience, perseverance, and humility. Valuing the role artmaking plays in my mental health, I have approached art as a practice similar to meditation."

"My sense of curiosity is equally matched with my work ethic and, as such, I have created art in a wide range of mediums and subjects. Rather than editorializing my experiences, I have typically prioritized trying to represent the world as it appears to me, and in my plein air work, let the visual language of paint be the only filter through which I manipulate the scenes. An exception to this is my studio work and, in particular, my series relating to Climate Change."

"The painting Fish in Troubled Waters, hanging on the end wall, represents the plight of coastal-dwelling populations due to rising sea levels and is based on my experience in Samoa, where I have witnessed coastal erosion and degraded coral reefs, and have been told by Samoans how little it seems their voice can be heard at a global level," added Keul. "The piece was included in the 5th National Climate Assessment and Climate Literacy Guide, representing Hawaii and US-affiliated Pacific Islands and a reproduction is featured in Art x Climate, an exhibition at the National Museum of Natural History, which opened April 22, 2025."

"While some of my works relating to the environment are direct, others are more subtle, as in the *Moral Threads* series of monotypes, having to do with consumption, environmental impact, and developing personal connections. This show threads together the strands of my life, from contemplative landscapes to socially and environmentally-engaged work, where technical and thematic narratives

James Keul received a Bachelors of Fine Art in painting from the Savannah College of Art and Design and continued his education at the Art Students League of New York, where he studied with artists Frank Mason, Mary Beth Mckenzie, Costa Vavagiakis and Cornelia Foss. His works grace collections around the world, including the Bekkjarvik Arts Society in Norway and the Metropolitan Museum of Art in Tokyo, and have appeared nationally and internationally in over 100 solo and group exhibitions, most recently at the GreenHill Center for NC Art, CAM Raleigh, and the Brown Gallery at Duke University.

Keul is also a teaching artist and considers himself to be a lifelong student. He was trained in classical oil painting materials and techniques using Dumond's Prismatic Palette, which is an invaluable tool for understanding value and color temperature. Keul is proud of this heritage and enjoys passing this knowledge along to a new generation of students.

In Flesh and Code invites viewers to explore the complex dynamics of human connection and belonging, both in-person and through screens.

Chloe Albers reflects on one-sided connections where one over-invests in a personality that exists beyond the screen. Her work is inspired by an experience in which she felt intense grief for the loss of her horse in a video game, despite knowing the horse was just a sequence of codes and pixels.

Albers' work explores metaphors such as an unperturbed digital horse representing an object of intense affection and the viewer or player in front of the screen existing as Napoleon Bonaparte, a powerful, narcissistic dictator who experienced obsessive yet unrequited love.

Shannon Corgan's paintings and drawings reflect on the complexities of how one chooses to reconcile with living in the shadow of the screen. Her distorted portraitures serve as reminders of our reflections in screens that often encompass our attention, blinding us from not only our physical selves but also from those around us.

Corgan's work plays with how we make connections online in order to compensate for the lack of real human connection that screen culture often steals from us.

Eavan O'Neil's interdisciplinary work explores connections in relationships and communities. Through the layering of transparent screens, O'Neil explores how varying but sincere perspectives blur realities. Her work highlights the impossibility of truly being known by and knowing other people. Like the layered materials, these differing realities build upon each other within communities and affect the dynamics of reciprocity, the give and take of genuine connection, requiring love and discomfort.

This show captures the beauty and complexity of human connections both tangible and imagined. Each artist's work meditates on the personal realities created within ourselves that are often at odds with the 'real world' and other perspectives. Each asks how to manage all these realities - physical, digital, mental - and how to navigate relationships in these different contexts.

Chloe Albers is an artist who mainly works with two-dimensional media. She was born and raised in a small town, surrounded by even more small towns and cornfields, in southern Illinois. In high school, she fell in love with painting portraits, and saw art as an opportunity to connect and to explore the human condition. She graduated from Southern Illinois University in Edwardsville with a Bachelor of Fine Arts with a specialization in painting and a minor in Business Administration.

Shannon Corgan is an artist specializing in the mediums of painting, drawing, and photography. She completed the Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree with a concentration in painting at Southern Illinois University Edwardsville in December of 2023. Her thesis work values and interprets the emotional and physical experience humans have with screens.

Corgan's first solo show, On Screen, exhibited at the Edwardsville Art Center in July of 2023. Her work has been featured in various juried exhibitions, including Annual Juried Art and Design Student Exhibitions at SIUE and the Wood River Small Works exhibition at The Wood River City Museum. She received Best of Show during the 2021 Small Works Exhibition at the Miller Art Creative Gallery in Saint Louis, MO. Her work has also been shown in the Annual Student Art and Design exhibitions at Southwestern Illinois College Schmidt Art Center and the juried group show, *En Plein* Air at the In Art Gallery in Edwardsville, IL. As of September 2024, she resides in Durm, NC, working from her home stud

Eavan O'Neil lives and operates out of Saint Louis, MO. She attended university at Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville (SIUE) where she received a full tuition waiver to pursue art and graduated Summa Cum Laude with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in painting, a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology, and a minor in art history. She is a mixed-media painter experimenting with large-scale layered compositions combining drawing, painting, and textiles.

Concentrating on themes of community and representing multiple perspectives within group portraiture, O'Neil's duplicated information can obscure, confuse, and muddle reality, or even contradict itself—just as multiple perspectives are often sincere while still being at odds. These works embody the notion of paradox and contradiction by paying tribute to the love, admiration, and wholeness experienced within relationships while saving space to wrestle with the impossibility of being known by and knowing other people.

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Outside of the studio, O'Neil has experience as a studio assistant, art instructor, and freelance painter, with commissions for live event painting and portraiture. Most recently, her work has been featured in: The Neon Museum of Saint Louis, The Sheldon, and Soulard Art Gallery - voted best gallery in Saint Louis four years in a row. Currently, she works as a full-time artist, curriculum coordinator, and painting instructor for

the Edwardsville Art Center and Saint Louis Artist Guild.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC, Offers Exhibition of Women Clay Artists From Japan

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC, will present the exhibit, *Radical Clay: Contemporary Women Artists from Japan*, on view at the Ackland Art Museum, from June 6 through Aug. 31, 2025.

"Examples by 36 individuals, from groundbreaking senior figures to emerging stars, positively flabbergast. This is work that must be seen to be believed." - *Chicago Tribune*.

Radical Clay celebrates thirty-six contemporary ceramic artists - all women - represented by works selected from the private collection of Carol and Jeffrey Horvitz. All have explored the technical and conceptual possibilities of clay. The works in this exhibition are inventive and expressive, at times mysterious or even shocking. The artists who created them are among the most technically accomplished contemporary ceramists. Some began their careers several decades ago while others started more recently - and over the past fifty years they have, each in her distinctive way, produced sculpture that pushes the physical limits of the medium.

Women have long been involved in the production of ceramics in Japan. Within that male-dominated tradition, their participation was largely confined to menial aspects of the process, with access to materials and kilns severely restricted. But since 1970 many more women - including most of those represented here - have been accepted into prestigious art academies, leading to an explosion of work that is less bound by convention. These artists often create forms

that emulate the infinite variety of nature, and some of them have developed painstaking, pioneering decorative methods.

Appearances, he says, "spread themselves lavishly and boldly, beckoning for closer scrutiny. And the show is breathtaking." Charleston. Galleries 8 & 9, Through Oct. 5 - "Picturing Freedom: Harriet Tubman and the Combahee River Raid". This exhibition is inspired by the untold story of the Combahee River Raid from the perspective of Harriet Tubman and the enslaved people she helped to free that is revealed for the first time through groundbreaking research by Carnegie Mellon University historian, Edda Fields-Black, Ph.D., in her recent book "COMBEE: Harriet Tubman, the Combahee River Raid, and Black Freedom during the Civil War". Working in collaboration with J Henry Fair, renowned environmental photographer, and guest curator, Vanessa Thaxton-Ward, Ph.D., Director of the Hampton University Museum, the exhibition carefully recreates the full journey of these brave soldiers and freedom seekers on that fateful moonlit night. On June 2, 1863, Harriet Tubman led the largest and most successful slave rebellion in the United States when her group of spies, scouts, and pilots piloted Colonel James Montgomery, the Second South Carolina Volunteers (300 Black soldiers), and one battery of the Third Rhode Island Artillery up the lower Combahee. African Americans working in the rice fields on seven rice plantations along the Combahee heard the uninterrupted steam whistles of the two US Army gunboats and ran to freedom. 756 enslaved people liberated themselves in six hours, more than ten times the number of enslaved people Tubman rescued on the Underground Railroad. The morning after the raid, 150 men who liberated themselves in the Raid joined the Second South Carolina Volunteers and fought for the freedom of others through the end of the Civil War. Gallery 2 and 3, June 6 - Sept. 14 - "Our Pet Project". Explore the delightful bond between humans and their furry companions in this charming exhibition showcasing works from our permanent collection. Featuring an array of artistic interpretations of cats and dogs, this exhibition captures their playful, loyal, and loving nature through painting, photography, and more. From serene portraits to lively, whimsical scenes, "Our Pet Project" invites visitors to experience the timeless allure of these beloved animals and their place in the artistic world. Galleries 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition - "18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Hotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition -"Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Columbia Museum of Art, Main & Hampton Streets, Columbia. Through Aug. 31 - "Sam Gilliam: Printmaker". Sam Gilliam (1933 – 2022) was one of the great innovators in postwar American painting. Early in his career, he made cleanedged abstractions in line with the Washington Color School painters. He gradually loosened up his style, soaking or pouring colors directly onto his canvases and folding them before they dried — a technique that creates accordion lines and a deep sense of texture. Around 1965, Gilliam

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made his greatest stylistic innovation: He got rid of the stretcher bars that traditionally underpin a painting and draped his canvases from the wall like sheets from a clothesline. Gilliam began his printmaking in the 1970s. He would occasionally use traditional techniques such as screen printing but would also take his prints back to the studio to cut them apart and stitch them back together with a heavy nylon filament, resulting in a series of highly innovative and unique works. Through Aug. 31 - "Let's Have a Talk Black Artists from the CMA Collection". Bringing together a multigenerational group of 15 Black artists working in and around abstraction, Let's Have a Talk pushes against longstanding expectations that work by Black artists must present a clear message about their racial identity and experience, and it celebrates their crucial, yet often dismissed, role in abstract art. Featuring sculpture, prints, paintings, and photography from the CMA Collection, this exhibition presents a range of abstract styles including Oliver Lee Jackson's expressive, gestural mark making, Lorna Simpson's ambiguous forms, and McArthur Binion's minimalist designs. Titled after conceptual artist Adrian Piper's socially provocative print included in the show, Let's Have a Talk is an open-ended invitation to start a conversation about Black artists' contributions to modern and contemporary art history and the many facets of abstraction. Within these discussions other dialogues may emerge - between artists, between unique objects, between viewer and image, and within ourselves. Galleries 5 & 6, Ongoing - "Modern & Contemporary Art from the Collection". Celebrating some of the CMA's greatest hits, this exhibition features over 30 paintings, drawings, photographs and sculptures from the Museum's collection that have not been on view recently. It offers the visitor experiences both serious and sensual and is designed to both entertain and enlighten. Notable works included are by Jasper Johns, Howard Thomas, Sally Mann and Edward Ruscha, whose famous image of the Hollywood Hills (on view) has become a staple of the art world. McCallum, a Sumter native, graduated in 1932 from Sumter High School, after which she enrolled at the University of South Carolina, and later studied at the Boston Museum School of Art. In addition to sustaining her career as a painter and printmaker, Mc-Callum pioneered art education in the South, teaching at the Gibbes Art Gallery, Telfair Academy in Savannah, Newberry College, and the College of Charleston. In 1960, she became the first professional Curator of Art Education at the Gibbes. Johns graduated as the valedictorian of his 1947 class at Edmunds High School, which was known as Sumter High School until the 1939-1940 school year. After attending the University of South Carolina, he relocated to New York City, where he gained prominence in the mid-1950s for his paintings of American flags, targets, alphabets, and numerals ("things the mind already knows," as Johns famously said). He is considered one of the most influential painters of the Post-World War era and America's preeminent living artist. McKoy graduated in 1965 from Edmunds High and has spent most of his life in Sumter. After studying architecture and biology at Clemson University, he joined his knowledge of the sciences with his uncanny skills as a carver, draftsman, and painter to achieve unique sculptures that fool the eye and defy gravity. His works are found in major public and private collections, most notably at Brookgreen Gardens and the Greenville County Museum of Art. Ongoing -Watermedia in the Age of Wyeth. When he was only 20, Andrew Wyeth (1917 - 2009) enjoyed a sold-out exhibition of his watercolors at New York City's Macbeth Gallery in 1937. The young artist was heralded for revitalizing the medium, and his career was launched. Over the next 72 years, as his methods evolved from broad abstracted washes of color to the intricate hatching of his signature drybrush technique, Wyeth firmly established his mastery of modern watermedia, which may include watercolor, gouache, tempera, acrylic, or ink (and combinations thereof). Selected from the GCMA permanent collection, this exhibition offers the opportunity to witness Andrew Wyeth's artistic evolution over time and invites comparison with other accomplished watermedia luminaries who worked during Wyeth's life. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. Simons (b. 1984, Flint Michigan, USA) is a visual artist, writer, educator, and safety advocate whose interdisciplinary art practice currently explores the intersections of queer identity, and experiencebased learning. Van Winkle Law Firm Gallery, Through Sept. 30 - "Iron and Ink: Prints from America's Machine Age," focuses on a dynamic era in American history when industrialization and advances in technology transformed urban landscapes and redefined the nature of work and leisure nationwide. Showcasing Collection prints from 1905 to the 1940s, Iron and Ink explores connections between industrial labor, urbanization, and the growing middle class. Ackland Art Museum, UNC - Chapel Hill, Columbia & Franklin Streets, Chapel Hill. June 6 - Aug. 31 - "Radical Clay: Contemporary Women Artists from Japan." The exhibit celebrates thirty-six contemporary ceramic artists - all women - represented by works selected from the private collection of Carol and Jeffrey Horvitz. All have explored the technical and conceptual possibilities of clay. The works in this exhibition are inventive and expressive, at times mysterious or even shocking. The artists who created them are among the most technically accomplished contemporary ceramists. Some began their careers several decades ago while others started more recently - and over the past fifty years they have, each in her distinctive way, produced sculpture that pushes the physical limits of the medium. **Through July 27 -** "Focus on the Peck Collection: Drawings for Paintings." Whether quick sketches from the imagination or highly detailed studies from life, drawings allow artists to refine their ideas and experiment with compositional structure, design motifs, figural groupings, and lighting schemes. This Focus on the Peck Collection installation highlights four drawings that served as the foundation for specific figural subjects in finished paintings. Dating from the seventeenth to the nineteenth centuries, these works reveal how Jacques Jordaens (Flemish, 1593-1678), Salvator Rosa (Italian, 1615-1673), Nicolas Lancret (French, 1690-1743), and David Wilkie (British, 1785-1841) used drawing to develop their subjects' form, expressions, postures, gestures, and movement. Together, they demonstrate how an initial idea, drawn on paper, is transformed and incorporated into a fully realized painted composition. Through July 13 - "Processing Systems: Bonding by Sherrill Roland". In the exhibition, monumental square grids of multi-colored numbers dominate the exhibition space like giant sudoku puzzles. To create them, artist Sherrill Roland reclaims United States Federal and State Correctional Identification Numbers and repurposes them through what he considers to be a systematized portraiture making technique. The grids on view act as logic exercises that scramble and rework the former correctional IDs of the artist and his father. The resulting wall drawings create theoretical portraits of the two subjects. The shared system employed to create the two works emphasizes the various bonds shared by these family members at the same time that the formal qualities of the drawings evoke lone figures bound by cells. Permanent Collection Galleries, Through Dec. **31, 2025 -** At any one time, there are about 250 works of art from the Ackland's distinguished permanent collection on view. The displays cover many eras and cultures, including most of the Museum's collection areas: the Ancient Mediterranean, Africa, Asia, the Americas, and Europe. Leif Gann-Matzen carves wooden sculptures from trees felled a stone's throw from the Eno River. In the process of carving, he works not to impose but to follow. The long, flowing forms of Leif's pieces present his memories of tree and river in solid beauty. This is the first time these pieces by Pete Sack have hung together on exhibit. They represent his figurative and abstract works expressing both an internal reflection of personal experiences and external observations of the ways in which we engage with others. Bechtler Museum of Modern Art, Levine

Center for the Arts, 420 South Tryon St., Charlotte. Fourth-Floor Gallery, Through June 8 - "Virginia Jaramillo: Principle of Equivalence," is the first retrospective devoted to the Mexican American artist's work. The exhibition traces Jaramillo's (b. 1939) practice from the mid-1960s to the present, featuring examples of her early work, paintings from her breakthrough Curvilinear series, her handmade paper works, and a selection of recent paintings, which together reveal her enduring engagement with and significant contributions to abstraction. Drawing on her ongoing study of subjects as wide-ranging as physics, the cosmos, archaeology, mythology, and modernist design philosophies, Jaramillo's work examines the relationship between the earthly and the metaphysical and explores the potential for abstraction to offer alternate ways of understanding our world. Virginia Jaramillo: Principle of Equivalence is organized by the Kemper Museum of Contemporary Art, Kansas City, Missouri, and curated by Erin Dziedzic, former Director of Curatorial Affairs. The Bechtler's presentation is organized by Bechtler Curator Katia Zavistovski. Plaza Gallery Through June 30 - "Nothing More Shocking than Joy: Niki de Saint Phalle from the Collection". Niki de Saint Phalle (1930-2002) was a visionary French-American artist whose work defies easy categorization. She began her career in the late 1950s, and over the following forty years became widely acclaimed for her vibrant and playfully subversive art practice. In 1964, she began her series of "Nanas" (French slang for "girls") life-size sculptures that celebrate the female form and embody Saint Phalle's assertion that "there is nothing more shocking than joy." As in Vive moi (Long Live Me) (1968) in the Bechtler Museum's permanent collection, the Nanas are brightly colored and patterned sculptures of voluptuous, exuberant women that represent female empowerment. In the late 1960s and early 1970s, Saint Phalle's work began increasing in scale, resulting in towering monumental sculptures such as Le grand oiseau de feu sur l'arche (The Large Firebird on the Arch) (1991). Standing over 17 feet tall and adorned with thousands of mirrored tiles, the work is inspired by the Slavic fairytale of the magical firebird, which symbolizes beauty, resilience, and liberation. With its joyfully outspread wings, Saint Phalle's The Firebird has welcomed visitors to the Bechtler since the museum opened in 2010, and its dazzling presence has become a beloved Charlotte landmark. This installation showcases works by Saint Phalle from the Bechtler's permanent collection in honor of the museum's 15th anniversary. Second Floor Gallery, Ongoing - "Departures and Arrivals: Art and Transnational Exchange". Throughout the twentieth century, artists across the globe responded to industrialization and rapid technological growth by rejecting traditional modes of artmaking and developing radically innovative ways to portray the shifting realities of the modern world. Many artists confronted the complexities of their time by embracing abstraction, experimentation, and increasingly expansive possibilities for cross-cultural exchange. The flow of people and ideas across geographical borders was integral in shaping modernism, resulting in dynamic networks of influence that transcended national boundaries and prompted new forms of visual expression. Many artists took advantage of more readily available opportunities to travel, often becoming active members of international art movements and communities. For others, war and persecution forced them into exile, where they made poignant works reflecting political turmoil and personal upheaval. Drawn from the museum's permanent collection, this exhibition highlights modern and contemporary artists whose practices were and are indelibly impacted by experiences of migration and transnationalism. Whether freely traversing borders or involuntarily displaced, these artists challenged artistic norms and brought new perspectives to bear on themes of place, belonging, and interconnectedness. Third Floor Gallery, Ongoing - "Antoni Tapies: Matter and Marks". This exhibition features a selection of works from the Bechtler Museum's permanent collection by Antoni Tàpies (1923-2012), a self-taught Spanish artist renowned for his innovative exploration of materiality and symbology. Over the course of his seven-decade-long career, Tapies made paintings out of nontraditional mediums

straw, creating textured surfaces that evoke a sense of history and touch. His printmaking practice reinforces this tactile, material-driven approach to artmaking. Using techniques such as lithography, etching, aquatint, and embossing, many of his prints echo the coarse surfaces and weathered appearance of his paintings. Tàpies's sculptures made later in his career likewise reflect these concerns. In Campana Petita (1990), for instance, the bronze material conveys durability while the bell's mottled surface and gaping cracks suggest deterioration. As in Campana Petita and the prints on view in this exhibition, the artist frequently incorporated an idiosyncratic vocabulary of signs into his work. Referencing sources as varied as the graffiti he saw on the streets of Barcelona, ancient scripts, and archetypal motifs, these marks underscore the interplay between the physical and the symbolic that pervades Tàpies's art practice. Ongoing - The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art is named after the family of Andreas Bechtler, a Charlotte resident and native of Switzerland who assembled and inherited a collection of more than 1.400 artworks created by major figures of 20th-century modernism and donated it to the public trust. The Bechtler collection comprises artworks by seminal figures such as Alberto Giacometti, Joan Miro, Jean Tinguely, Max Ernst, Andy Warhol, Alexander Calder, Le Corbusier, Sol LeWitt, Edgar Degas, Nicolas de Stael, Barbara Hepworth and Picasso. Only a handful of the artworks in the Bechtler collection have been on public view in the United States. Admission: Yes. Through Aug. 17 - "Cherry, Khalif Tahir Thompson," is the first institutional solo exhibition in the United States, features eight large-scale paintings that explore themes related to identity, memory, and emotion. Imbued with a sense of nostalgia yet charged with a contemporary energy that bridges the tangible and the imagined, Thompson creates layered compositions that invite viewers into intimate spaces, drawing from the artist's personal experiences, family archives, and broader cultural narratives. "Cherry" invites viewers to explore how identity is remembered, shared, and reimagined, celebrating the complex layers of human experience.

Through Sept. 21 - "Black Behind Bars: The Untold Story of Black Biker Culture". Curated by Dr. Keith Cradle and Ricky Singh. Through the lens of acclaimed photographer Alvin C. Jacobs. Jr., this exhibit is a striking visual exploration of Black biker culture and its profound impact on identity, mental well-being, and community. "Black Behind Bars" highlights the open road as a sanctuary, offering freedom, healing, and resilience. It challenges stereotypes and illuminates the therapeutic power of riding, where the hum of an engine becomes a form of meditation. Black bikers have historically contributed to American motorcycle culture, yet their story and legacy remain untold. This exhibition urges viewers to reconsider their preconceptions about the bike culture and its riders. The exhibition celebrates the Delhom Service League's enthusiastic support for the Mint by proudly displaying significant works funded or gifted by the affiliate group, plus selected publications, photographs and other memorabilia. In 2022, the Delhom Service League made the difficult decision to dissolve as a Mint affiliate. The league nevertheless remains an indelible part of the Mint's history, and its many contributions rightly deserve the museum's never-ending recognition and gratitude. Through Aug. 10 - "Women of Land and Smoke: Photographs by Graciela Iturbide and Maya Goded". The exhibition includes over 50 photographs that present an overview of Iturbide and Goded's careers that span the Americas. For the past three years, the Mint has been building a significant portfolio of works by Mexico City-based photographers Graciela Iturbide and Maya Goded. Over the decades, the two photographers have created revealing, poignant, and powerful images that examine the intersection of contemporary life and centurieslong practices throughout North and South America. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases. "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina — Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cutting-edge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and cream-colored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. This exhibition presents photographs from the Nasher Museum's permanent collection that highlight the effect of human activity on the global climate and the role that hope and youth play in our collective future. Continuing the conversation sparked by the exhibition. "Second Nature: Photography in the Age of the Anthropocene," the installation was curated by the Bass Connections project team, "Climate Hope: Action Rooted in Visual Arts + Nature Education". This interdisciplinary research initiative brings together Duke and K-12 students and teachers with the goal of empowering students to understand climate challenges, envision positive solutions, and become a new generation of environmental stewards. Through June 22 - "On the Same Wavelength: Art, Science & Conservation". Nearly sixty years ago, Duke University staff brought a seventeenth-century sculpture to the hospital on a stretcher, hoping to uncover the secret of what lay hidden in the wooden friar's chest. Although technology has changed since then, the spirit of interdisciplinary collaboration at the heart of the scientific study of artworks remains. Technical art history, the focus of this exhibition, brings together art historians, conservators, and scientists to gain deeper insights into works of art and the methods and intentions of their makers.

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Through July 15 - "Art of the Andes". Art of the Andes features ceramics, textiles, metalwork, and carvings produced by cultures across the Andes region, a 4,500-mile-long mountain range on the Pacific Coast of South America. The gallery includes a variety of works to encourage visitors to think about how these narratives shape our understanding and may preserve or counter fallacies of nationhood and democracy. 

Ortiz keeps Cochiti pottery traditions alive but transforms them into a contemporary vision that embraces his Pueblo history and culture and merges it with apocalyptic themes, science fiction, and his own storytelling. Virgil Ortiz brings his narrative to life at HMA through immersive projection and sound, augmented reality, traditional Cochiti pottery, monumental contemporary pottery, and surprises being debuted at our Museum. This exhibition encourages repeat visitation as you engage with the story and meet the rebellion's protagonists. The Catawba have lived on their ancestral lands along the banks of the Catawba River dating back at least 6,000 years. Before contact with the Europeans it is believed that the Nation inhabited most of the Piedmont area of South Carolina, North Carolina and parts of Virginia. Early counts of the Catawba people made by Spanish explorers estimated the population of the tribe at the time as between 15,000-25,000. After settlers arrived in the area, two rounds of smallpox decimated the tribe's numbers, and by 1849 the once large group was down to under 100 citizens. Now there are currently over 3,300 enrolled members of the Nation. The Catawba have a long history and a rich culture that lives on today. Objects Gallery, Through Aug. 31 - "I AM: Michael Gates". 

By 1997 the New York Times predicted he "is certain to influence the work of a new generation ... in the same way that Mr. [Richard] Avedon pioneered so much of what is familiar today" in portrait and fashion photography. Portraits are often taken at face value - as accurate representations of a person's appearance, sometimes removed by decades or centuries. But portraits are often the products of delicate negotiations between artist and subject. Sometimes they flatter, exaggerating the sitter's beauty or rich attire. Sometimes they capture the subject engaged in his or her occupation, whether pausing during study or painting in his or her studio. Sometimes they celebrate an auspicious occasion, such as a recent engagement or the imminent birth of a child. This exhibition features three centuries of portraits of men and women, Black and White. solitary and companionate, classic and modern. "Good Impressions" was mounted to mark the recent conservation treatment of John Singleton Copley's 1762 "Portrait of Mrs. Daniel Rogers" (Elizabeth Gorham Rogers) in the collection of Wake Forest University, and Reynolda House's recent acquisition of Kwame Brathwaite's 1973 photograph "Changing Times". West Bedroom Gallery, Through Oct. 19 - "Leigh Ann Hallberg: Phenoms". In her "Phenoms series", artist Leigh Ann Hallberg creates large-scale abstract paintings inspired by her journey through local landscapes, including the Reynolda landscape. Hallberg, who has taught painting at Wake Forest University since 1999, chose a square format for the series, which she says leaves the viewer's understanding of the work open - the abstract painting is neither portrait nor landscape. Instead. it is a pretend space in which the viewer is able to reconsider and reimagine their experience of nature through the works. Hallberg employs a variety of color palettes and metal leaf. She uses the medium of watercolor in order to pull out its inherent qualities of flow, dripping, and puddling, which she considers nearly indexical with substances of the natural world: water, soil, and vegetation. In fact, most of the watercolor pigments are derived from materials found in the earth. The metal leaf invokes the idea of time and its passage, as the viewer's perception of the leaf (reflective, a void, a light) shifts over the course of the day, under various lighting conditions and viewing angles. The works in the "Phenoms series" represent Hallberg's felt resonance with and sense of wonder about the natural world. East Bedroom Gallery, Through Dec. 31 - "Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda".

Hise: The Black Experience at Reynolda". "Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear / I rise." Maya Angelou's poem "Still I Rise," published in 1978, was an assertion of dignity and resilience in the face of oppression. In the 1980s, Angelou used Reynolda as her stage, sharing words of humanity, survival, and triumph. But before her, numerous Black lives impacted and intersected with the story of Reynolda. "Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda" examines the lives of the Black women and men who helped shape Reynolda as it evolved from a Jim Crow era working estate into a museum for American art. From 1912 through the 1950s, during one of

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the most repressive climates for Black people in North Carolina history, Black men and women navigated Reynolda's segregated spaces-farming the land, constructing buildings, and working as domestic staff within Reynolda's walls. During this era, segregation, the exploitation of Black labor, and laws that regulated Black behavior affected the lives of all individuals in the Reynolda story, whether at Reynolda or at the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company. While the struggle for equality did not end with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the story of Reynolda pivoted to one of a public cultural institution. When it opened its doors in 1967, Reynolda's intersection with Black lives shifted as the young, fledgling museum provided a venue for Black artists to celebrate their art. Artists such as Jacob Lawrence, Romare Bearden, and Maya Angelou transformed the historic setting into a stage for their art and teachings. Through art, letters, photographs, and audiovisual recordings, "Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda" examines Reynolda's complicated past in a space designed for reflection and healing. This exhibition has been made possible in part by the National Endowment for the Humanities. East Bedroom Sleeping Porch, Ongoing - Featuring a condensed version of the fall 2023 exhibition "Smith & Libby: Two Rings, Seven Months, One Bullet". This semi-permanent exhibition presents a fascinating look at an unsolved shooting that rocked the Reynolda estate and made national headlines in 1932. Like most family homes, Reynolda House witnessed its share of tragedies, none more shocking than the death by gunshot of Zachary Smith ("Smith") Reynolds, youngest child of R.J. and Katharine Smith Reynolds. Soon after midnight on July 6, 1932, Smith was shot on a sleeping porch at the family's country estate. Smith died later that morning. Smith's wife Libby Holman and Smith's childhood friend and secretary Albert "Ab" Walker wre ultimately charged with first-degree murder. In a stunning reversal, the case was dropped before coming to trial. To this day, it is not known whether Smith Reynolds, 20-year-old heir and renowned aviator, died by suicide, accident or murder.
